Collaborative Sciences Project

March marked the launch of the Collaborative Sciences Project (CSP) for DPI students, a key feature of the I-V (Investigate-Verify) presentation series. As part of the CSP, students had the unique opportunity to visit the Bangladesh Rice Research Institute (BRRI) for a scientific field study.

The visit allowed students to explore how core scientific disciplines—biology, chemistry, physics, and ESS—interact in real-world agricultural research and practice. Through guided tours and discussions with experts, they discovered how physics is applied in machinery and energy use, how chemistry contributes to soil and fertilizer management, how biology is central to crop development, and how ESS informs sustainable farming techniques.

Following the field trip, students were grouped across subjects to create collaborative presentations that explained how each science plays a role in BRRI's agricultural innovations. The aim of the CSP was not just to deepen students' understanding of their own disciplines but also to foster appreciation and knowledge of others—highlighting the interconnected nature of science in solving global challenges.

The CSP culminated in a series of insightful student presentations, reflecting thoughtful research, teamwork, and a broadened scientific perspective. It was a true celebration of interdisciplinary learning.
